2 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank y'all  
3 for coming to the January meeting of the  
4 Mississippi State Board of Dental Examiners.  
5 And in kicking that off, I'm going to ask  
6 Dr. Scarbrough to lead our prayer for us this  
7 morning, please.

8 (Invocation)

9 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: At this  
10 time, we would like to recognize our guests.  
11 If you will please stand and tell us who you  
12 are and who you represent, we'd appreciate  
13 it.

14 MS. EKLUND: I'm Neva Eklund, and I'm  
15 the public policy advocate for the  
16 Mississippi Academy of Pediatric Dentistry.

17 DR. MOSER: Corey Byars; I don't  
18 represent anyone currently.

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: We're glad  
20 to have you anyway.

1 DETERMINATION OF A QUORUM AND APPROVAL OF AGENDA/  
2 APPROVAL OF BOARD MEETING MINUTES  
3 DATED NOVEMBER 7, 2025

3 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay. I  
4 would like to put forth at this time the  
5 approval of our past minutes.

6 Does anybody got any questions about  
7 those, any additions, takeaways?

8 (No response)

9 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: I move that we  
10 dispense with the reading of the minutes and  
11 accept them as proposed.

12 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: I second.

13 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All right.  
14 Do we have a second?

15 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: Second.

16 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Any  
17 discussion?

18 (No response)

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in.

20 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

21 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Any oppose?

22 (No response)

23 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All right.

24 Thank you.

25 I talked to Wesley. I know we have a

1 hearing this morning, and it might help us to  
2 go ahead and move that up on the schedule if it  
3 would be convenient for you.

4 Now, I think we're okay on our weather  
5 today, so I don't think anybody is going to be  
6 freaking out about that. I think we're okay  
7 for the next two or three days.

8 But just as a matter of convenience, and I  
9 know y'all have schedules, I think I would like  
10 to move that up if it's okay with the Board.  
11 And we can go ahead and get that out of the  
12 way, and then we can pretty much breeze through  
13 this thing.

14 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Yes.

15 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Can we do  
16 that?

17 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: We can do  
18 that.

19 Lou, if you wouldn't mind, I'm going to  
20 take your seat just for the hearing.

21 So, Mr. Byars, we're going to start with  
22 you. You can have a seat right there in the  
23 middle, and I'll be sitting here next to you.

24 Also, Denny, does Phillips, our Attorney  
25 General representative, have access to that?

1 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: No.

2 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: He does  
3 not?

4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: I  
5 wasn't aware we were changing, so I haven't  
6 put it on the folders yet. But I'll do that  
7 in just a second.

8 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you.

9 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: If the  
10 Board would click on the folder that looks  
11 like a folder, you should see a file with  
12 Mr. Byars' name on it and pull up the  
13 documents there.

14 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: And I  
15 would ask that you not access those until  
16 they have been admitted into evidence, but  
17 that is the location where they may be  
18 accessed.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK:  
20 Mr. Strickland, were you able to find  
21 them?

22 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Yes,  
23 sir.

24 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: We are  
25 ready to proceed.

1 PUBLIC HEARING/REQUEST FOR LICENSURE REINSTATEMENT  
2 REGARDING COREY BYARS

3 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Good  
4 morning, everyone. My name is Phillips  
5 Strickland. I am with the Attorney General's  
6 Office, and I'll be your Hearing Officer  
7 today.

8 Today's date is January 23rd, 2026. The  
9 time now is 8:36 a.m. And we are present here  
10 at the Board Offices at 715 South Pear Orchard  
11 Road, Suite 200.

12 This is in the matter of File or Case  
13 No. 4789-22DH; is that correct?

14 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: That would  
15 be the license number.

16 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: That's  
17 the license number?

18 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: That is.  
19 And the docket number would be 2025-053.

20 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND:  
21 2025-053?

22 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: That's  
23 correct?

24 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: And  
25 this is a request for licensure

1 reinstatement --

2 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: It is.

3 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: -- by

4 Mr. Corey Byars.

5 Again, Mr. Byars, welcome. Again, my name  
6 is Phillips Strickland. I'll be the Hearing  
7 Officer. My role during today's proceeding is  
8 to rule on objections to questions or evidence  
9 that is raised -- that are raised by the  
10 parties, and to see to the orderly  
11 administration of the proceedings, and to  
12 ensure that the hearing is conducted in  
13 accordance with applicable laws and rules.

14 MR. BYARS: Yes, sir.

15 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: And the  
16 Board will be the decider of any questions of  
17 fact.

18 At this time, I would like to have the  
19 members of the Board introduce themselves for  
20 the record. If you would, just state your name  
21 for the record.

22 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Lewis  
23 Grubbs.

24 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: Haley  
25 Birmingham.

1 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: David Curtis.

2 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: Alexa

3 Lampkin.

4 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: John Carlton.

5 BOARD MEMBER DR. JOE: Stephen Joe.

6 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: Wade Bishop.

7 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Will  
8 the attorney for the Board please state your  
9 name for the record?

10 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Yes. My  
11 name is Westley Mutziger.

12 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Thank  
13 you. And the petitioner is present today,  
14 correct?

15 MR. BYARS: That would be me, right?

16 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Yes.  
17 Would you please introduce yourself?

18 MR. BYARS: My name is Corey Byars.

19 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Are you  
20 represented by counsel today?

21 MR. BYARS: No.

22 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: And you  
23 understand that you have the right to an  
24 attorney?

25 MR. BYARS: Yes.

1           HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: And you  
2 understand that you have the right to have  
3 witnesses testify on your behalf and that you  
4 would have the right to subpoena -- have  
5 subpoenas issued by the Board; and  
6 notwithstanding the same, you wish to proceed  
7 without counsel present today?

8           MR. BYARS: Yes, that's fine.

9           HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: So,  
10 today, we're going to proceed as follows:

11           We're going to start with opening  
12 statements for both parties, and then we'll  
13 move into you presenting your case-in-chief,  
14 your evidence. You'll tell your -- present any  
15 evidence and statements that you would like to  
16 make as to why your license should be  
17 reinstated.

18           MR. BYARS: Okay.

19           HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: So are  
20 there any preliminary matters that you would  
21 like to address before we get started?

22           BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Yes. At  
23 this time, I would offer -- or, rather, I  
24 would move that the Exhibits B-1 as well as  
25 Exhibits R-1 through R-13 be admitted into

1 evidence.

2 And, Mr. Byars, just for identification  
3 purposes, Exhibit B-1 is a copy of the  
4 surrender of your license.

5 R-1 is a copy of the letter of  
6 recommendation; R-2 is another letter of  
7 recommendation that you e-mailed to me; and R-3  
8 through R-13 are all of the continuing  
9 education course certificates that you have  
10 provided to me.

11 MR. BYARS: (Nods head affirmatively).

12 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: All  
13 right. Are there any objections to these  
14 records being entered into evidence?

15 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: No, sir.

16 MR. BYARS: No, sir.

17 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: All  
18 right. Seeing none, we will have these  
19 Exhibits B-1 as well as R-1 through R-13  
20 entered into the record as evidence.

21 (EXHIBIT NUMBER B-1 MARKED

22 AND ADMITTED INTO THE RECORD)

23 (EXHIBIT NUMBERS R-1 THROUGH R-13

24 MARKED AND ADMITTED INTO THE RECORD)

25 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Are

1     there any witnesses that need to be sworn in  
2     at this time?

3             BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   I believe  
4     just Mr. Byars.

5             HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND:

6             Mr. Byars, I'm going to have the court  
7     reporter swear you in at this time.

8             MR. BYARS:   Okay.

9                     COREY BYARS,  
10            having first been duly sworn,  
11            testified as follows:

12            HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND:   Thank  
13     you.

14            At this time, I will allow the parties to  
15     present opening statements.  I'll start with  
16     the Board's attorney, and then I'll allow  
17     Mr. Byars to go.

18            MR. BYARS:   (Nods head affirmatively).

19                     OPENING STATEMENTS

20            BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   Thank you.

21            So may it please the Board?  We are here  
22     today in the matter of Corey Byars, a dental  
23     hygienist seeking reinstatement of his license.

24            Mr. Byars surrendered his dental hygiene  
25     license on approximately July 29th of 2025.  He

1 did so in relation to the following findings of  
2 fact as found in that consent order:

3 Mr. Byars was initially issued a dental  
4 hygiene license, No. 4789-22DH, on June 13th,  
5 2022. In or around March of 2025, the Board  
6 conducted a random compliance audit for the  
7 biannual renewal period of January 1st, 2023  
8 through December 31st of 2024, to ensure  
9 compliance with Board Regulation 41, the  
10 Board's continuing education requirements.

11 The respondent, or Mr. Byars, was randomly  
12 selected to participate in that audit. In  
13 response to the audit, Mr. Byars submitted  
14 evidence of completion of eight hours of  
15 Board-approved continuing education.  
16 Therefore, he failed to meet the required  
17 standard of 20 hours of Board-approved  
18 continuing education as required by Board  
19 Regulation 41. Mr. Byars then entered into a  
20 consent order to surrender his license in  
21 response to that violation.

22 Today, Mr. Byars is seeking reinstatement  
23 of his license. It is his burden to carry to  
24 show why that license should be reinstated.  
25 This Board is vested with the authority, upon a

1 showing of good cause, to reinstate that  
2 license.

3 So I would just ask that the Board  
4 consider all evidence duly admitted today and  
5 testimony and make a decision that is in line  
6 with the interest of protection of the public.

7 Thank you.

8 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND:

9 Mr. Byars, this is your opportunity to  
10 present an opening statement; and an opening  
11 statement is simply a summary of the argument  
12 that you intend to make when you put on your  
13 case-in-chief or make your testimony.

14 Is there an opening statement that you  
15 would like to make to the Board at this time?

16 MR. BYARS: Well, I'm not really, you  
17 know, sure what I'm supposed to say, but I do  
18 want to thank you guys for allowing me to be  
19 here.

20 And I guess I'm just here to tell my  
21 story, you know. There wasn't anything like  
22 malicious going on or anything like that. It  
23 was just a series of unfortunate events.

24 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Thank  
25 you.

1           At this time, we will move into each side  
2   presenting their case-in-chief. And this is  
3   your opportunity to speak to the Board; speak  
4   candidly, relax, and just tell -- present to  
5   them everything you've done to get to a point  
6   where you can have your license reinstated. So  
7   the floor is yours.

8           MR. BYARS: So is this just the  
9   tell-my-story part, basically?

10          HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Yes.  
11   Tells us about -- tell the Board about the  
12   exhibits you entered as evidence, and tell  
13   them about your reasons why your license  
14   should be reinstated.

15          STATEMENT/EXAMINATION OF COREY BYARS

16          MR. BYARS: Got it. I understand.

17          Well, so the whole reason that I gave up  
18   my license in the first place was because, like  
19   I said, there was a series of unfortunate  
20   events that led me to sort of step away from  
21   hygiene for a little while. I stopped working  
22   my last hygiene job around December 21st of  
23   2024, and I decided that I wanted to try other  
24   things. So I was trying like sales jobs and  
25   stuff like that. Then the audit came around,

1 and I went through looking to see if I could  
2 find any of my old CEs that I thought that I  
3 had done through training and old work and  
4 whatnot, but I couldn't place anything.

5 And then came the fine portion and all of  
6 that. And because the jobs that I was trying  
7 at the time weren't really working out, I  
8 just -- I wasn't making any money. And it  
9 was -- it was a real tough time, basically, the  
10 entirety of the last year money-wise. So at  
11 the time, it seemed like the best thing to do  
12 to avoid paying the fines and everything was to  
13 surrender my license.

14 But, you know, like I said, I don't know.  
15 Things have changed. I'm just ready to get  
16 back into it. That's why I took Mr. Mutziger's  
17 advice and completed all of the CEs that I  
18 needed to complete as well as just a little bit  
19 more. I got myself a few letters of  
20 recommendation from some friends that I had  
21 worked with, and here we are.

22 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: All  
23 right.

24 At this time, tell us about the exhibits  
25 that you entered into evidence. Those are

1 continuing education courses that you took?

2 MR. BYARS: Yes.

3 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: At this  
4 time, I'm going to let -- I'm going to turn  
5 you over to Board counsel for questioning.

6 MR. BYARS: (Nods head affirmatively).

7 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you,  
8 Mr. Strickland.

9 EXAMINATION

10 BY BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:

11 Q. So, Mr. Byars, thank you for being here  
12 today. You have submitted to the Board some  
13 evidence of continuing education requirements.

14 Could you please give the Board a total  
15 number of hours that you've submitted?

16 A. I think it was 26, 27.

17 Q. Okay.

18 A. It was the -- I think you get the four  
19 hours from the CPR and then -- I lost count, but it  
20 was either 22 or 23 from online courses from like  
21 Colgate Oral Health and all of that.

22 Q. So it would be fair to say in excess of 20  
23 hours?

24 A. Yes.

25 Q. Including you are current on your CPR

1 certification; is that right?

2 **A. Yes.**

3 Q. And these continuing education credits, --  
4 I see that in examining the exhibits, Colgate Oral  
5 Health Network -- are these accredited providers?

6 **A. I was under the impression that they were.**

7 Q. Yes. So I would bring to your  
8 attention -- for example, I am looking at Procter &  
9 Gamble; AGD Provider, the Academy of General  
10 Dentistry, which is, in fact, a Board-approved  
11 provider of continuing education. So I would agree  
12 that the materials that you have submitted are, in  
13 fact, Board-approved.

14 So you also provided some letters of  
15 recommendation today; is that right?

16 **A. That is correct, yes.**

17 Q. Who did you provide letters of  
18 recommendation from?

19 **A. One was from Kendra Conley; she was**  
20 **another hygienist that I worked with at two separate**  
21 **locations: Dr. Ware's Dental Office in Flowood and**  
22 **at Sunnybrook Dentistry and Braces in Jackson.**

23 And the other was from Dr. Jerry Dean  
24 Tankersley, who I worked with at Dental Group of  
25 Byram, which was my first hygiene job out of

1 college.

2 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: And those  
3 are within the file for the Board to review  
4 at your discretion.

5 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: One of  
6 those will not open. I've gotten it open  
7 under a different program, but I can't print  
8 it. Can I put it on the screen?

9 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Certainly.

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: I've  
11 had a request to see it. It won't open as a  
12 PDF.

13 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: So that's  
14 not available to any of the Board members?

15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: No.

16 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Okay. Is  
17 the Board -- are you able to read that on the  
18 screen? I can provide a physical copy if  
19 necessary. I will just allow the Board time,  
20 before I proceed, to read that letter.

21 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Who is that  
22 one from?

23 MR. BYARS: This one was from Kendra  
24 Conley.

25 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Denny,

1           would you mind sending a copy to the printer?

2                   EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: It  
3           won't print. This is a free program, and I  
4           would have to upgrade it to be able to print.

5                   BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Of course.

6                   EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: And I  
7           don't have a credit card with me to upgrade  
8           it, so...

9                   BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: My  
10          apologies.

11                   EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: That's  
12          what I get when I try to print it  
13          (indicating).

14                   BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Well,  
15          we'll find a way to make that available to  
16          the Board in physical form.

17   BY BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:

18          Q.     So, Mr. Byars, is it your testimony today  
19          that you surrendered your license due to the  
20          inability to pay the fine associated with the  
21          consent order offered to you?

22                **A.     Yes.**

23          Q.     And you do understand today that if the  
24          Board decided to reinstate your license, that they  
25          could, in fact, attach conditions, such as payment

1 of that fine, --

2 **A. Absolutely.**

3 Q. -- as well as costs for the proceedings  
4 that have taken place?

5 **A. Yeah, I'm aware. That is correct.**

6 Q. And you are able and willing to pay those  
7 today or within a time period as determined by the  
8 Board?

9 **A. Yes, absolutely.**

10 Q. If the Board also saw fit to order that  
11 you complete the Board's jurisprudence examination,  
12 something that you would have completed at the time  
13 that you completed your initial application for  
14 licensure, would you comply with that requirement?

15 **A. I would, absolutely.**

16 Q. Now, you did mention, Mr. Byars, that you  
17 ended employment at the end of December of 2024,  
18 roughly?

19 **A. Yes.**

20 Q. Was your separation from employment at all  
21 the result of poor performance or unsatisfactory  
22 work as a hygienist?

23 **A. No, not at all. That was -- it was my  
24 personal decision to leave.**

25 Q. So there were no patient complaints or

1 outstanding alleged violations --

2 A. No.

3 Q. -- that we don't know about?

4 A. No, not that I'm aware of. No; no. No,  
5 nobody -- if there was ever a complaint against me,  
6 nobody ever brought it up to my attention, no.

7 Q. And, further, you understand that moving  
8 forward, should you be awarded reinstatement of your  
9 license, that the continuing education requirement  
10 will be each and every biannual renewable cycle?

11 A. Yes; yes, that will work.

12 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: No further  
13 questions.

14 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Thank  
15 you.

16 Do members of the Board have questions for  
17 the witness, Mr. Byars, at this time?

18 EXAMINATION BY THE BOARD

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Do you have  
20 a job that you can go to if you get your  
21 license back?

22 MR. BYARS: I'm sorry?

23 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Do you have  
24 employment if you get your license back?

25 MR. BYARS: I don't. I don't have

1 anything in the works yet. I didn't want  
2 to -- I didn't even want to start looking,  
3 you know, or entertaining the possibility  
4 until I knew for sure if I was going to get  
5 my license back, you know. I didn't want to  
6 get my hopes up, so to speak.

7 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I got it.

8 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: You are a  
9 rarity being a male hygienist, so kudos to  
10 you. Thank you for picking the profession of  
11 dental hygiene.

12 MR. BYARS: I've been told. Thank you.

13 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: So,  
14 therefore, other hygienists may look up to  
15 you. So this is one of the reasons to have  
16 made CEs, you know, affordable and being able  
17 to assess CEs. They're free online now, and  
18 you can take them online, except for CPR. So  
19 as long as you're aware of that, just stay on  
20 top of your CEs.

21 MR. BYARS: Oh, absolutely. It was just  
22 a -- it was a hard few years like with  
23 everything that went on at my old jobs and  
24 everything, so it just sort of slipped  
25 through the cracks.

1 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: I'm glad  
2 things have turned around for you.

3 MR. BYARS: Thank you. I'm hoping that  
4 they continue on that trend, yeah.

5 BOARD MEMBER DR. JOE: And now you have  
6 a love and appreciation for dental hygiene?

7 MR. BYARS: You could say that, yeah, a  
8 little more so than I did; yes, for sure.  
9 After being out and doing other things, I do  
10 miss it. I miss it a lot. And there was a  
11 lot there that I had going for me that I just  
12 couldn't see at the time.

13 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Any  
14 additional questions from the Board?

15 (No response)

16 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Seeing  
17 none, we thank you, Mr. Byars, for your  
18 testimony today.

19 Are there any other witnesses that you  
20 would like to call on your behalf?

21 MR. BYARS: No, sir.

22 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: At this  
23 time, I will allow the opportunity for both  
24 sides to make a closing argument. I'll start  
25 with the Board's attorney, Mr. Mutziger.

1 CLOSING ARGUMENTS

2 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you,  
3 Mr. Strickland.

4 So, today, again, you have before you  
5 Mr. Corey Byars, who, as I stated, surrendered  
6 his license due to violation of the Board's  
7 continuing education requirements. Mr. Byars  
8 has appeared today and has delivered in excess  
9 of the required 20 hours, as well as current  
10 CPR certification.

11 I would put to you that he is a candidate  
12 worthy of consideration for this Board for  
13 reinstatement. And I would ask that the Board  
14 use its good judgment in considering to  
15 reinstate his license, always paramount  
16 considering the health and safety of the  
17 public.

18 Finally, I would add or ask that should  
19 the Board, in fact, award reinstatement of his  
20 license, that they consider imposition of the  
21 conditions that would have been in play for a  
22 consent order for any other person in that  
23 circumstance when violating Board Regulation 41  
24 for the first time. That would be a fine of  
25 \$500; that would be completion of the Board's

1 jurisprudence examination; and that would be  
2 payment of costs of any proceedings the Board  
3 has taken on in this matter.

4 With that said, I would defer to the  
5 Board's discretion in whether or not to  
6 reinstate Mr. Byars' license.

7 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Thank  
8 you.

9 Mr. Byars, again, I'll offer you an  
10 opportunity to make any closing statements or  
11 closing arguments on your own behalf should you  
12 choose to. You don't have to, but the floor is  
13 yours.

14 MR. BYARS: I guess I don't really have  
15 anything else to say other than, again, thank  
16 you for your time and thank you for allowing  
17 me to be here. I greatly appreciate it.

18 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Thank  
19 you.

20 The time is now 8:55. The Board will take  
21 this matter under advisement and --

22 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: And, in  
23 fact, the Board may wish to determine if an  
24 executive session is appropriate, or you  
25 could wait to have an executive session later

1 in the day. It's up to the Board.

2 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I guess we  
3 can include at the end of the day when we do  
4 everything else.

5 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: At the  
6 end of the day?

7 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: If that's  
8 all right with everybody else.

9 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: You all  
10 would like to do it later?

11 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Unless you  
12 think we should do it now. Are you saying  
13 that?

14 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: I'd say  
15 let's go ahead and entertain it. That way if  
16 you have -- if you need the assistance of the  
17 Attorney General, you have that, and they can  
18 be released from our utility today.

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay.  
20 Good.

21 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: Is  
22 there a motion for a closed determinative  
23 session?

24 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: So moved.

25 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: Second.

1 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: All in  
2 favor?

3 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

4 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: We are  
5 now in closed determinative session for the  
6 Board to be able to discuss the need to enter  
7 into executive session. So at this time, we  
8 will have all parties that are not to be in  
9 the room, that are not Board members or asked  
10 to stay by the Board, to please exit.

11 This concludes the hearing.

12 (ENTER EXECUTIVE SESSION)

13 \*\*\*\*\*

14 (EXIT EXECUTIVE SESSION)

15 \*\*\*\*\*

16 BOARD RULING

17 HEARING OFFICER MR. STRICKLAND: The  
18 time is now 9:05, and the Board has returned  
19 from executive session.

20 After considering the subject matter at  
21 hand, the case at hand, the Board has moved to  
22 reinstate the license of Mr. Corey Byars,  
23 License No. 4789-22DH.

24 The Board has also moved and voted to have  
25 Mr. Byars pay a fine of \$500; Mr. Byars must

1     also take and pass the jurisprudence exam; and  
2     must pay the cost of the administrative  
3     proceeding, not to exceed \$150.

4             This concludes the hearing today. And we  
5     thank everyone for their time. Also, a final  
6     copy of the -- a copy of the Final Order of the  
7     Board will be distributed to you in the coming  
8     weeks.

9             DR. MOSER: Thank you. I don't know  
10    what else to say. Thank you so much.

11            BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Don't say  
12    anything. Just don't come back again.

13            (HEARING CONCLUDED AT 9:06 A.M.)

14                             AGENDA ITEMS

15            BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay.  
16    We're going to pick back up with the  
17    Committee reports. We appreciate y'all  
18    indulging us on that and let us get that out  
19    of the way.

20            Rules and Regs, Dr. Curtis?

21            BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: I have nothing  
22    to report. Our Committee has not met since  
23    the last Board meeting.

24            BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS:  
25    Credentialing, Ms. Birmingham?

1 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: Nothing to  
2 report.

3 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Practice  
4 Act and Legislative, Dr. Bishop?

5 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: The  
6 legislature is in session. Right now, there  
7 are four bills that affect us:

8 House Bill No. 431 by Mr. Felscher, who  
9 spearheaded the general supervision bill last  
10 year, has resubmitted this to add the allowance  
11 for public health, for the hygiene to work  
12 under general supervision in public health  
13 settings.

14 Senate Bill 2194 introduced by Senator  
15 Blackwell, amends the Section 73-9-13 to  
16 authorize -- specifically authorize the Board  
17 to regulate general supervision with regard to  
18 hygiene, both direct and general supervision.

19 House Bill 1366 introduced by  
20 Representative Mansell, basically is  
21 changing -- is a proposal to change the  
22 Practice Act to make the practice of  
23 dentistry -- unauthorized practice of dentistry  
24 in Mississippi a felony rather than a  
25 misdemeanor, which, if y'all recall, in

1 previous discussions, we had talked about how  
2 Alabama had done that and felt like that  
3 helped -- helped them regulate some of that  
4 more carefully and closely.

5 Lastly, and this was just introduced in  
6 the last day or two, -- and I think we've  
7 probably all gotten an e-mail on it -- Senate  
8 Bill 2550, also introduced by Senator  
9 Blackwell, amends the Practice Act to more  
10 specifically regu- -- not regulate, but  
11 instruct us as to how we will deal with general  
12 supervision, and that bears a little closer  
13 look after discussing this with Mr. Hydrick  
14 yesterday.

15 So I think later, in our meeting on our  
16 agenda further down the line, he and  
17 Mr. Mutziger will be discussing all four of  
18 these bills in more depth with us.

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All right.  
20 Thank you.

21 Licensure Examination, Dr. Lampkin?

22 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I have  
23 nothing to report.

24 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Budget and  
25 Finance, Dr. Bishop? I know you've worked

1 hard on this.

2 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: I'm learning  
3 more. If you look at the -- if you've looked  
4 at your financials, we have year over year  
5 '25 -- fiscal year '25 and fiscal year '26.

6 The first thing I looked at was our  
7 expenditures. We should have been around  
8 50 percent. Basically, we're under 50 percent,  
9 so that's good. Our available operating cash  
10 year over year is similar.

11 Will you point that out? Thank you.

12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: Right  
13 here, this is '25, and this is the current  
14 fiscal year.

15 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: So we still  
16 have about as much money in the bank, so to  
17 speak. But it was pointed out to me, and  
18 it's significant, that we do have expenses  
19 coming up in the second half of the year  
20 related to the Physicians Health Network and  
21 the Board of Pharmacy that will be  
22 substantial and probably affect that as we go  
23 forward.

24 So, once again, if you have any questions,  
25 I'll refer them to Mr. Hydrick.

1 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Is  
2 everybody good with that?

3 (No response)

4 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All right.  
5 License and Applications, this is UROLA and  
6 Hygiene. Ms. Sims? Ms. Birmingham?

7 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Okay. So for  
8 the first one, it will be Brandy Suter. She  
9 is applying for a license by reciprocity.  
10 She's been licensed in Louisiana since 1992,  
11 and she is a resident of Mississippi.

12 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: I make a  
13 motion to approve her license for dental  
14 hygiene in Mississippi.

15 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: Second.

16 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

17 (No response)

18 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
19 favor?

20 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

21 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay.

22 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: The next one  
23 is Tanya Smith, also applying by reciprocity.  
24 She has been licensed in Arizona from 2021 to  
25 presently; California 2008 to 2024; Hawaii,

1 2008 to 2023; and she also is a resident of  
2 Mississippi.

3 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: I make a  
4 motion to approve her license for dental  
5 hygiene in Mississippi.

6 BOARD MEMBER DR. JOE: I second.

7 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

8 (No response)

9 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
10 favor?

11 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

12 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank you.

13 Okay. Active Status, Dr. Bishop and Sims?

14 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: So the first  
15 one is Preston Miller. He is requesting  
16 active status, and he also applied for a  
17 specialty license.

18 Dr. Miller was issued a license on 2001.  
19 He graduated from the University of Tennessee  
20 and attended the orthodontic residency at UT  
21 also. So after his residency, he began  
22 practicing in Tennessee.

23 He just obtained a license in Mississippi  
24 and did not practice here. There will be a  
25 group of orthodontists coming from Tennessee

1 and opening up a practice in North Mississippi.

2 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: I move we  
3 reinstate. I make a motion we reinstate.

4 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: Second.

5 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

6 (No response)

7 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
8 favor?

9 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

10 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank you.

11 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Okay. Annie  
12 Clark is also requesting active status. She  
13 was issued a license in 2023. She graduated  
14 from North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 2022.

15 She has always practiced in North  
16 Carolina, but she has a contract to move back  
17 home to begin her practice in Mississippi at  
18 Jackson-Hinds Comprehensive Center.

19 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: I make a  
20 motion we reinstate Ms. Clark's license,  
21 Dr. Clark's license.

22 BOARD MEMBER DR. JOE: I second.

23 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

24 (No response)

25 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in

1 favor?

2 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

3 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank you.

4 Specialty Applications, Dr. Carlton and  
5 Ms. Sims.

6 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Okay. So  
7 Specialty, this is Dr. Miller. He has just  
8 requested active status to return back to  
9 Mississippi. So he is just requesting  
10 specialty in Mississippi upon returning back  
11 to active status.

12 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: I make a  
13 motion to approve that.

14 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I second.

15 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

16 (No response)

17 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
18 favor?

19 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

20 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Dr. Langford  
21 was just issued a license in December 2025.  
22 He is applying for a specialty license and a  
23 Class II sedation permit also.

24 He graduated from Columbia University in  
25 2021, and he did his pediatric residency from

1 2021 to 2023. He will be working for UMC,  
2 hopefully, by the summer.

3 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: I make a  
4 motion to approve.

5 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: Second.

6 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

7 (No response)

8 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
9 favor?

10 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

11 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Advanced  
12 Anesthesia Permits, Dr. Lampkin and Ms. Sims?

13 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: This will be a  
14 Class II anesthesia permit for Dr. Langford,  
15 who was just approved for a specialty  
16 license.

17 Same. He graduated from Columbia  
18 University, went through a residency program,  
19 and hopes to be working at UMC this summer.

20 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I make a  
21 motion to approve this permit.

22 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I second.  
23 Discussion?

24 (No response)

25 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: All in favor?

1 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

2 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay. We  
3 have a Zoom now; is that right?

4 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: I've got one  
5 more.

6 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: We've got one  
7 more, Emillie.

8 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I'm sorry.  
9 I'm getting ahead of myself. Go ahead, Lou.

10 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Okay. So the  
11 next one is Emillie Schenck. She applied for  
12 a Class II, but didn't qualify, so she  
13 qualified for a Class III. As you see, it  
14 was approved by the AAP from Dr. Caloss.

15 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I make a  
16 motion that we approve the Class III permit.

17 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: Second.

18 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Discussion?

19 (No response)

20 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
21 favor?

22 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

23 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank you.  
24 Now, do you want to handle this?

25 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Yes. With

1 the help of Ms. Sims, I shall.

2 REQUEST FOR ELIGIBILITY DETERMINATION FOR LICENSURE

3 BY CREDENTIALS/PRESENTATION BY CHARLES MOSER, DDS

4 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Next on

5 the agenda, we have a request for eligibility

6 determination for licensure by credentials by

7 Dr. Charles Moser.

8 Lou, if it would be all right, do you mind

9 just giving a very brief summary of this --

10 excuse me -- Dr. Moser's application?

11 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: Okay. So

12 Dr. Moser is applying by credentials in which

13 by law you must have practiced for the past

14 consecutive five years according to our law,

15 73-9-24. But for proving the clinical

16 practice of dentistry, he could not provide

17 that to me.

18 So, therefore, we are here today for the

19 Board to make a decision on his application for

20 credentials.

21 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you,

22 Ms. Sims.

23 So just to be clear, Dr. Moser, he did

24 submit an application, as you stated, by

25 credentials. And, as you stated, pursuant to

1 Mississippi Code Annotated Section 73-9-24,  
2 someone applying by credentials, according to  
3 Subsection B, shall be engaged in the active  
4 practice of dentistry in full-time dental -- or  
5 in -- let me start over. I apologize.

6 Shall be engaged in the active practice of  
7 dentistry or in full-time dental education for  
8 the past five years; is that correct?

9 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: That's  
10 correct.

11 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Okay.  
12 Thank you.

13 And so, in reviewing the application  
14 submission by Dr. Moser, what stood out to you  
15 regarding this provision?

16 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: The  
17 consultant.

18 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: The  
19 consultant. And so, how many years of  
20 practice was he able to provide?

21 LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS: He wasn't able  
22 to provide any, no years of clinically  
23 practicing dentistry.

24 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: And so,  
25 Dr. Moser, as I understand, it was

1     communicated that due to him not meeting this  
2     requirement, he was ineligible for licensure  
3     by credentials, correct?

4             LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS:   Correct.

5             BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   And it was  
6     then that you received a request by Dr. Moser  
7     to address the Board so that Dr. Moser could  
8     make his case as to his present and past  
9     employment and whether or not that qualifies  
10    as active dental practice or dental  
11    education; is that correct?

12            LICENSING REP. MS. SIMS:   Correct.

13            BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   Okay.

14    Thank you.

15            And so, I understand that today we have  
16    Dr. Moser online via Zoom.   And at this time, I  
17    would turn over the floor to you, Dr. Moser, to  
18    answer that question and make your case as to  
19    showing your past practice and employment,  
20    whether or not that constitutes the active  
21    practice of dentistry or dental education for  
22    the past five years.   And I will let you know  
23    that the Board has allocated you 15 minutes to  
24    make this presentation.

25            So, Dr. Moser, we turn it over to you.

1 DR. MOSER: It won't take 15 minutes.

2 I'll probably take about one and a half and  
3 then happy to answer any questions.

4 Again, I appreciate the opportunity to  
5 speak today. And as a dentist, many of you can  
6 probably appreciate we tend to be a bit  
7 overprepared, so I have a written statement.  
8 And, like I said, it won't take very long.

9 I want to begin by reminding or, perhaps,  
10 informing many of you on the Board that in  
11 2006, in my 16th year of practice with three  
12 practices, I had a catastrophic injury to my  
13 practicing hand that caused me to have to leave  
14 chairside dentistry. This was never the plan,  
15 clearly. Dentistry was my childhood dream, and  
16 it's been my life's work. And when my  
17 disability made traditional clinical practice  
18 no longer possible, I was still able to  
19 dedicate myself to roles that ensured quality,  
20 safety, and integrity within the profession.

21 I became a mentor in a D- -- in a Medicaid  
22 DSO practice here in the state of Texas. I ran  
23 16 locations for that DSO and mentored well  
24 over a hundred young clinicians throughout that  
25 time. I opened my own dental consulting and

1 coaching company because I recognized that  
2 after working with a DSO, the practitioner on  
3 the corner, which is extremely important to our  
4 industry, that they continued to see and treat  
5 the people in their neighborhoods; I did not  
6 want to see those individuals go away. I am  
7 not anti-DSO, but I'm also very pro small,  
8 individual entrepreneurial dentist business  
9 person. And they needed help, and I had the  
10 tools and training and resources to provide  
11 them the help to, perhaps, reduce their stress  
12 level a little bit of having to be both a  
13 provider and a business owner. So that's what  
14 I did.

15 Today, I serve as the National Dental  
16 Director of Clinical Services for Liberty  
17 Dental Plan. We're a third-party administrator  
18 for mostly federal and state programs, which  
19 includes Medicaid and Medicare populations. We  
20 take our responsibility to these groups very  
21 seriously.

22 Myself, I lead a team of nine clinicians  
23 whose work focuses on ensuring high standards  
24 of quality and mostly preventing fraud, waste,  
25 and abuse in our industry. These decisions

1     require ongoing clinical judgment, evaluation  
2     of treatment appropriateness, and oversight of  
3     provider conduct. This is unquestionably work  
4     that impacts patient care and public protection  
5     every day.

6             Now, Liberty Dental Plan is growing as the  
7     states that we work with recognize our  
8     commitment to being good stewards of finite  
9     resources that are available. We will be  
10    working in Mississippi. For compliance and  
11    governance reasons, we must have certain  
12    administrative and clinical oversight  
13    structures within the state. My company would  
14    like me to serve at the top of that structure,  
15    as I do here in the state of Texas, to ensure  
16    consistency, accountability, and continuity.  
17    If I can't hold that Mississippi license, my  
18    organization will be forced to look outside for  
19    someone else to fill this role. The challenge  
20    with that is that it could introduce  
21    unpredictability and may reduce the level of  
22    oversight that we can provide, which could  
23    result in changes, something I believe that  
24    would not serve Mississippi dentists, patients,  
25    or the programs as well.

1           My intent is simply to continue serving  
2   the profession of dentistry in the only way  
3   that my disability at this point allows,  
4   through clinical leadership, quality oversight,  
5   and protection of public health.

6           I have lectured. I will be lecturing at  
7   the Chicago midwinter meeting next month. I've  
8   lectured pretty much all across the country. I  
9   was a KOL for Dentsply for many, many years. I  
10   cannot clearly, in good conscience, lecture on  
11   clinical dentistry anymore, so I've moved into  
12   realms of leadership, communication,  
13   accountability, and running small teams. My  
14   record in the state of Texas is absolutely  
15   squeaky clean. I've completed two audits,  
16   random audits, I guess, for the Texas State  
17   Board of Dental Examiners for continuing  
18   education.

19          I take my job very, very seriously.  
20   Dentistry was the only thing that I ever wanted  
21   to do since the age of 13. For some reason,  
22   someone decided that a different path for me  
23   was to be taken, and that's what I've done.

24          So I respectfully ask the Board to  
25   consider that my role still aligns with the

1 spirit of the Mississippi requirements and  
2 supports the highest standards of care for the  
3 citizens of the state of Mississippi.

4 Thank you very much. I'll answer any  
5 questions that you have.

6 QUESTIONS BY THE BOARD

7 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you,  
8 Dr. Moser. And I will -- just for a point of  
9 clarification before the Board members ask  
10 any questions that they may have, I do want  
11 to focus in on the issue, which, as you can  
12 understand, is a matter of how our statute is  
13 crafted and has no personal bias towards your  
14 specific situation; but, rather, we are just  
15 looking at the letter of the law. As you may  
16 have heard previously, our Dental Practice  
17 Act requires that you be engaged in the  
18 active practice of dentistry or dental  
19 education for the past five years.

20 In examining your application, you have  
21 provided that you, from December of 2024 to  
22 present, have been employed, as you have said  
23 here today, with Liberty Dental Plan, correct?

24 DR. MOSER: That's correct.

25 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: And prior

1 to that, from February of 2017 to November of  
2 2023, you were employed in a nonclinical  
3 setting. I think that it would be helpful  
4 for the Board if you could detail that  
5 employment.

6 DR. MOSER: So, yes, that was my work,  
7 and still is ongoing, as a coach and a  
8 consultant. I am oftentimes asked to come to  
9 offices, you know, to work with clinicians,  
10 to work with leadership teams. Again, I  
11 would respectfully submit that practice of  
12 dentistry has, perhaps, a broad  
13 interpretation and that my role as a coach  
14 and a consultant, which typically includes  
15 working with, again, dental leadership, would  
16 pass muster, if you will.

17 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Do the  
18 Board members have any questions for,  
19 Dr. Moser?

20 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: Dr. Moser, you  
21 will be renewing your Texas license in June  
22 this year?

23 DR. MOSER: Absolutely correct. That  
24 license was too hard to get to not -- to ever  
25 let that lapse. I think we would all agree.

1           BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON:   So you don't  
2   have to actively practice dentistry in Texas  
3   to maintain a license?

4           DR. MOSER:   You do not.

5           BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   There does  
6   not appear to be anything further from the  
7   Board.

8           Is there a motion by the Board to take any  
9   action to deviate from the determination of  
10   ineligibility already determined by Board  
11   staff; meaning, the Board determined him  
12   ineligible?  If the Board saw that the  
13   five-year standard was, in fact, met, a motion  
14   would be needed or required to go on record  
15   indicating such.

16          BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS:   I have a legal  
17   question.  According to the statute, did I  
18   hear correctly that the practice of dentistry  
19   would include being in education?

20          BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER:   Yes, I  
21   will read that for you again.  It states that  
22   one must be engaged in the active practice of  
23   dentistry or in full-time dental education.

24          BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS:   So the  
25   question, I think, that we need to determine

1 is -- I would just take, for example, I'm a  
2 member of faculty at UMC. That may not  
3 actually be a hands-on practice anymore, but  
4 be a full-time teacher that would qualify to  
5 hold a license.

6 Would we consider this gentleman's  
7 practice of being a consultant, coach, mentor,  
8 that sort of thing fall under that category of  
9 being an educator?

10 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: That would  
11 be up to the Board to determine. That is  
12 precisely the question, is whether his work  
13 history in this non-clinical setting would,  
14 in fact, constitute dental education to  
15 satisfy the requirements of the statute?

16 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I have a  
17 question for Legal. Based on the criteria  
18 and requirements in the state of Mississippi,  
19 do you feel like he meets the requirements  
20 for us to reinstate his license -- or give  
21 him a license?

22 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: So I have  
23 already advised the Board staff that it is  
24 the opinion that what has been provided  
25 previously in the application does not

1     constitute the practice of dentistry over the  
2     past five years. And so, that is the  
3     position of the Board presently, yes, that it  
4     does not meet that standard.

5             So you will have needed to have heard  
6     something today to convince you that his  
7     employment in the non-clinical setting does, in  
8     fact, meet that requirement. Is that clear?

9                     (No response)

10            BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Dr. Moser,  
11     thank you for being here today. I have one  
12     question.

13            Your employment as a consultant/  
14     coach/mentor, is that a full-time position?

15            DR. MOSER: Yes, sir, it was.

16            BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: So you do that  
17     full time?

18            DR. MOSER: Yes, sir. You could -- I  
19     don't know that you would right now, but you  
20     could visit my websites, of course, and that  
21     would be further clarification of exactly  
22     what my roles and responsibilities were.

23            BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: Are you  
24     working with, like, actually young licensed  
25     dentists, or are you working with student

1 dental providers in this clinic?

2 DR. MOSER: I'm sorry. The audio is not  
3 so great. If maybe you could get closer to  
4 the mic?

5 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I'm asking,  
6 do you work with young licensed dental  
7 professionals, or are you working with  
8 student dental providers in that clinic? Do  
9 they rotate through that clinic?

10 DR. MOSER: No, we -- this was a  
11 professional environment with graduate, you  
12 know, dentists. These were not students.

13 I did -- actually, I was a volunteer  
14 professor at the University of Texas here in  
15 Houston working at the AEGD when I was still  
16 able to practice. So, again, I just -- I only  
17 say that to reinforce my commitment to helping  
18 dentists, whether I was able to practice or  
19 not.

20 As I said, this was -- it was a traumatic  
21 time, as you can imagine, losing your ability  
22 to do something after 16 years and then having  
23 to reinvent yourself more than just once.

24 So, I, again, respectfully ask to perhaps  
25 expand that definition of the practice of

1 dentistry and the educational aspect of that to  
2 include the work that I have dedicated years  
3 and hundreds of hours to become proficient in  
4 being able to do that, as I like to say, to  
5 help dentists cry a little bit less every day,  
6 if you will. It's a very challenging  
7 profession.

8 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: Dr. Moser,  
9 have any of your presentations over the years  
10 qualified to extend continuing education  
11 credits to dentists or dental staff teams?

12 DR. MOSER: So, I -- yes, I have been  
13 able to do that, and sometimes I will -- PACE  
14 accreditation is extremely difficult, if  
15 you've ever been through that process. So,  
16 now, it's much easier to perhaps piggyback on  
17 someone else's PACE credentials and you're  
18 able to offer continuing education credits.  
19 When I do lecture and when I do go on-site, I  
20 do not clearly -- I do not -- I am not able  
21 to provide the scientific and clinical  
22 credits that are part of the requirements for  
23 the states. I am able to fulfill the  
24 business and administrative credits for those  
25 individuals.

1           BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Dr. Moser,  
2   when you're working with licensed dentists in  
3   the clinic, are you ever involved with  
4   mentoring these dentists with regard to  
5   treatment planning for the patient?

6           DR. MOSER: So, yes, sir, we do talk  
7   about treatment planning. But, again, I  
8   always want to be very respectful of the  
9   practice that I'm in; and having been out of  
10   dentistry, I can talk about -- and, by the  
11   way, all of my mentors were Pankey dentists  
12   and Pete Dawson-type of dentists, and this is  
13   the dentistry that I practiced when I was  
14   able to do so. I have gold onlays in my  
15   mouth as we speak that have been there for  
16   well over 25 years. But, again, I want to be  
17   very respectful of the offices that I'm in  
18   because I understand that the treatment of  
19   dentistry has changed; materials have  
20   changed; procedures have changed and things  
21   of that nature.

22           So I come at it from the standpoint of  
23   what would -- what does quality dentistry look  
24   like to them, what do quality outcomes look  
25   like to them, and how do we drive to those

1 outcomes. I am fairly concerned about people  
2 that I get involved with. In other words, if  
3 someone wants to just hire me to come in and  
4 help them make more money, that's not a client  
5 that I'm ready to take on. There's going to be  
6 a lot of discussion about that. I grew up in a  
7 world of dentistry where if you did great  
8 dentistry and you took care of the people, the  
9 money would follow, and that worked for me.  
10 When I was in private practice, I never  
11 advertised, but that was back in the day. But,  
12 again, there's money to be made in dentistry by  
13 taking care of people and doing quality  
14 dentistry.

15 Even in the insurance industry today, you  
16 know, again, it's a challenge because we  
17 certainly -- like I said, my department alone  
18 in the last year identified well over a hundred  
19 million dollars in fraud, waste, and abuse that  
20 we were extremely happy that we were able to  
21 effectuate some change upon.

22 So that's a long answer to your very  
23 simple question. I am always promoting quality  
24 dentistry and comprehensive care. That can  
25 look different when I walk into particular

1 offices, but I am very discriminating of that.

2 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: Mr. Mutziger,  
3 when you considered your opinion about  
4 Dr. Moser's credentials, did y'all have  
5 extended discussion about how his credentials  
6 might relate to the educational aspect of the  
7 law?

8 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: So  
9 regarding those discussions, I would be happy  
10 to share those with you. I think they would  
11 be more appropriate in executive session. If  
12 you found an executive session was something  
13 that you wished to pursue, we could entertain  
14 that motion. But I would not want to engage  
15 in staff discussions regarding consideration  
16 of an application in open session.

17 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: Fair enough.

18 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Anything  
19 further by the Board?

20 (No response)

21 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I would  
22 like for us to maybe push this to executive  
23 session and finish our discussion, if that  
24 would be okay with the Board.

25 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I agree.

1           BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Yeah, I think  
2 we should.

3           BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: So I would  
4 move that we take this matter up in executive  
5 session.

6           BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: So we move  
7 to enter closed determination session to see  
8 if executive session is appropriate.

9           Do we have a second?

10          BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Second.

11          BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: All right.  
12 At this time, we will close the meeting once  
13 again to the public.

14          Dr. Moser, we will be entering executive  
15 session at this -- or excuse me. We're  
16 entering closed session to determine if  
17 executive session is appropriate. We will  
18 inform you of the Board's determination  
19 regarding that as well as any action taken in  
20 executive session if deemed appropriate. We  
21 will keep you abreast of that.

22                   (OFF ZOOM VIDEOCONFERENCE)

23          BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: I would  
24 say that executive session is appropriate  
25 given that we're seeking legal advice

1 regarding prospective litigation,  
2 potentially.

3 So I'm going to go announce that to the  
4 public, and then we'll talk.

5 (SHORT PAUSE)

6 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: All right.  
7 You may commence discussion.

8 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: So do we need  
9 to have a motion to -- you need to help us  
10 out on our rules of order.

11 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: You  
12 technically do need a motion to enter  
13 executive session.

14 BOARD MEMBER DR. BISHOP: So moved.

15 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Second.  
16 All in favor?

17 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

18 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Okay. So  
19 you are now officially in executive session.

20 \*\*\*\*\*

21 (ENTER EXECUTIVE SESSION)

22 \*\*\*\*\*

23 (EXIT EXECUTIVE SESSION)

24 \*\*\*\*\*

25 BOARD RULING

1           BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: We are  
2 back on the record, as the Board has voted to  
3 exit executive session.

4           In executive session, the Board voted to  
5 uphold the Board's staff determination of  
6 ineligibility for licensure by credentials for  
7 failure to show evidence of five years of  
8 full-time dental practice or dental education.

9           Therefore, Dr. Moser, you remain  
10 ineligible for licensure in Mississippi;  
11 however, the Board would like to inform you  
12 that should you continue in your role in your  
13 present employment with -- forgive me. The  
14 name of the employer is -- with Liberty Dental,  
15 thank you, as that does constitute the practice  
16 of dentistry, if you remain in that practice  
17 for another four years, then you will have  
18 satisfied that five-year active practice  
19 requirement and may make reapplication to the  
20 Dental Board at that time.

21           Alternatively, license by reciprocity is  
22 available to you should you move or have your  
23 residence become -- or move to Mississippi, of  
24 which case you would become eligible for a  
25 license by reciprocity.

1           With that being said, that concludes this  
2   matter.

3           DR. MOSER: Thank you for your time.

4           BOARD ATTORNEY MR. MUTZIGER: Thank you.

5           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay. At  
6   this time, we're going to take a ten-minute  
7   break. I'm sorry, guys, if y'all don't mind.  
8   I apologize for running y'all in and out, but  
9   we will take a quick ten minutes and be right  
10   back.

11                               (OFF THE RECORD)

12           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: We are back  
13   in session.

14           We're going to talk about corporate trade  
15   names. And unless the Board has an issue, I  
16   would like to take up both of these  
17   collectively, please.

18           Ms. Vaughn?

19           DEPUTY DIRECTOR MS. VAUGHN: The first  
20   one on your list is a request from a  
21   Dr. Scarlett Johnson. She was licensed in  
22   2020. She is requesting the name Bay Breeze  
23   Dental Group. The location is going to be  
24   528 Courthouse Road in Gulfport, Mississippi.  
25   An additional dentist, a Dr. Mark Stringer,

1 is going to be at that location. And, again,  
2 they are requesting Bay Breeze Dental Group.

3 And the second one on your list that  
4 you'll see is a request from a Dr. Deidra  
5 Snell. She has been licensed since 2008. She  
6 is requesting a change from Ridgewood Dental to  
7 Jones Family Dentistry, LLC, and that is her  
8 maiden name. So she is requesting to change  
9 from Ridgewood to Jones Family Dentistry, LLC.

10 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: I need a  
11 motion to accept these.

12 BOARD MEMBER DR. JOE: I'll make that  
13 motion.

14 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Second?

15 BOARD MEMBER DR. CARLTON: I'll second.

16 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
17 favor?

18 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

19 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Thank you.

20 All right. The portable dental unit, Aria  
21 Dental Care. Ms. Vaughn?

22 DEPUTY DIRECTOR MS. VAUGHN: We have a  
23 request for a portable dental unit from Aria  
24 Dental Care. The operator and owner is going  
25 to be a Dr. Erin Rake. And the staff, the

1 dentists that are going to be associated with  
2 it, is Dr. Shenika Kelly, Dr. Sabrina  
3 Huckabay, Dr. Sabrina Jones, Dr. Brad Bryan,  
4 and Dr. Shekerra Strong.

5 And these are going to be a portable  
6 dental unit, and they're going to be going into  
7 healthcare facilities pretty much all over the  
8 state. You'll see in your attachment that they  
9 put all of the active facilities in the state  
10 of where they're going to be attending.

11 An inspection was done and was approved,  
12 you know, passed. And, again, this is for Aria  
13 Dental Care, a portable dental unit.

14 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Who did the  
15 inspection? Did you do it?

16 DEPUTY DIRECTOR MS. VAUGHN:  
17 Investigator Redmond.

18 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay. I  
19 need a motion.

20 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: So moved.

21 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: A second?

22 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: Second.

23 BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: All in  
24 favor?

25 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

1           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS:   Moving  
2   along, Mr. Hydrick?

3           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK:   You'll  
4   note in the materials that were submitted all  
5   of the licenses and permits that were issued  
6   in the second quarter of fiscal year 2026.   I  
7   just present those to you for your  
8   information.

9           Also, next on the list is the financials.  
10   Are there any additional questions?   We've kind  
11   of already talked about those items.   I just  
12   reiterate what Dr. Bishop said, that the PMP  
13   payment, the Prescription Monitoring Program  
14   Payment; the Board of Pharmacy; and the  
15   Professional Health Network payments will be  
16   made in, probably, January or February.   So  
17   that's, you know, a little over a hundred-and-  
18   something-thousand-odd dollars, but that comes  
19   out of the subsidies and loans, which we've  
20   spent zero percent of that year to date.   So  
21   those payments will be made in the next few  
22   weeks, but we are under 50 percent on all of  
23   our line items as far as expenditures for the  
24   first half of the year.

25           And as far as just my Executive Director's

1 Report, you do have a copy of that. I won't  
2 read it to you. I'll just hit some quick  
3 highlights.

4 We did complete the biannual renewal cycle  
5 for all dental licenses on December 31st.  
6 You'll notice we had 130 licensees who --  
7 excuse me. There were 135 licensees who did  
8 not renew, so their licenses were voided on  
9 January the 1st. Some of those are by  
10 retirement, and so they notified us of that.  
11 And if you were to look them up, it would say  
12 "void - retired." But we have 135 fewer dental  
13 licenses than when we started the renewal  
14 cycle.

15 I did look back in 2023; and after that  
16 renewal cycle, we did have 120 licensees'  
17 licenses that voided. But over the course of  
18 the two years, we issued 165 new dental  
19 licenses. And so, you know, our numbers,  
20 though they remain pretty stagnant, I do  
21 anticipate the same over the next couple of  
22 years, that we'll be back to around that 17- to  
23 1800 level for general dental licenses issued  
24 in the state.

25 I did note that of those that renewed this

1 past cycle, 183 of those were registered but  
2 not actively practicing in Mississippi. Per  
3 the Practice Act, we are required to maintain a  
4 list of those not actively practicing.

5 Any questions about that, just the renewal  
6 cycle?

7 (No response)

8 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK:

9 Hygienists and radiology permit holders  
10 will renew in the calendar year of 2026, but  
11 the fiscal year of 2027, starting September the  
12 1st. And so, make sure your hygienists and  
13 radiology permit holders are aware of that.  
14 And, of course, we'll be sending out lots of  
15 e-mails.

16 Just as a reminder, also, of upcoming  
17 dates, -- I don't think I listed it -- but  
18 Tuesday night we will have a Zoom meeting with  
19 our AAP, Advanced Anesthesia Panel, those  
20 facility inspectors, those permit holders that  
21 did the facility inspections for us. And, of  
22 course, you-all, as Board members, as well as  
23 the public are, you know, open to attend that  
24 via Zoom on Tuesday, starting at 5:30, or in  
25 person. If you want to be here in person,

1 we'll have dinner for anybody that wants to  
2 come in person. It's just to get feedback on  
3 the process of those inspections. As you know,  
4 the Board did 120 or so, 125, I think,  
5 inspections within a five-month, six-month time  
6 period, and so it's just to get feedback on how  
7 that process went and any discussions related  
8 to Regulation 30 as it applies to those  
9 facility inspections.

10 As I mentioned at the last Board meeting,  
11 you know, the Board did invest almost \$80,000  
12 of our budgeted funds in that process, and so I  
13 think it's significantly -- a significant  
14 investment in public safety on behalf of the  
15 Board, so I appreciate that you were willing to  
16 invest those funds. That will not be  
17 recoverable because there were no fees charged  
18 for those inspections, and so I think that  
19 certainly should be noted, the Board's  
20 investment in this process.

21 Any questions about that?

22 (No response)

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: I won't  
24 spend a lot of time on legislative updates,  
25 but I think that's the next thing on the

1 agenda. Dr. Bishop did a great job of  
2 highlighting those bills that are currently  
3 out there as it relates to the practice of  
4 dentistry and dental hygiene.

5 I did overlook one that is very important  
6 in a good way. I guess I missed that two days  
7 ago. But Senate Bill 2543 was dropped two days  
8 ago, and that's AADB Compact. So that is now  
9 out there as far as consideration. As you  
10 know, Louisiana adopted it last year; so if  
11 Mississippi were to adopt it this year, we  
12 would be the second state. And it would be  
13 logical in the sense that it would be a good  
14 partnership between Louisiana and Mississippi  
15 as it relates to compact licensure. So be  
16 paying attention to that.

17 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: I have a  
18 question.

19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: Sure.

20 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: Isn't -- or I  
21 may be wrong. But isn't the AADB Compact  
22 like the lesser of the two evils kind of  
23 thing?

24 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: Yes.

25 So it's just -- you know, there are

1 significant differences between the CSG -- I  
2 forget what it's called exactly -- compact  
3 and the AADB. But, yes, it is the one that  
4 the Board has gone on record to support, and  
5 so --

6 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: Yeah. We  
7 supported it last time, but it didn't -- or  
8 they said that we didn't need that compact  
9 or --

10 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: I'm not  
11 very clear on what happened to it last minute  
12 last year.

13 BOARD MEMBER DR. LAMPKIN: That's why  
14 I'm confused. So are they saying like in  
15 general they're not doing any compact? Is  
16 that the good news that we're saying or --

17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: So, no.  
18 The AADB Compact has been filed again this  
19 year with the hope that, you know, it would  
20 be the one that is moved forward.

21 BOARD MEMBER MS. BIRMINGHAM: I think it  
22 requires the hands-on skills test and --

23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: So last  
24 year, if you remember -- and I don't want to  
25 put anybody on the spot, but the AADB

1 lobbyist is present, and she may be able to  
2 answer it more specifically. But last year,  
3 it passed both chambers -- that's not right.

4 Why don't you explain it? I'll be quiet.

5 MS. SIMMONS: I'm Lindsey Simmons, and  
6 we do represent the AADB just for this  
7 compact issue.

8 It did pass the house last year; and in  
9 the senate, at the end, really nothing came out  
10 of Public Health there towards the end. Just  
11 kind of too many bills came over and they just  
12 kind of said, "We're not doing anything else."

13 But there was concern about being the  
14 first state. And, I mean, y'all know we are  
15 always concerned about being the first to do  
16 anything. So they just kind of said, "We're  
17 going to wait and see." So I do think it's  
18 helpful that Louisiana passed it, so we'll see  
19 where it goes this year.

20 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: So that  
21 has passed. And, again, it's early in the  
22 session. So who knows what will happen? But  
23 that will move forward.

24 And then the other bills that we  
25 mentioned, the house bill is putting the

1 language back into 73-9-5 that was removed last  
2 year that the Health Department wanted. So  
3 that was actually voted on by the full house  
4 chamber this week, so it's, I guess, now been  
5 sent to the senate.

6 And then there's a couple of senate bills  
7 related to -- one to 73-9-5 and making some  
8 significant changes to that as it relates to  
9 general supervision. And then there's a  
10 proposed bill to 73-9-13, which gives  
11 additional language under the "Powers and  
12 Duties of the Board" and how the Board  
13 regulates general supervision.

14 I think I've sent copies of those to  
15 everybody; but if you didn't get it and want a  
16 copy, I'll be glad to send that.

17 And there's a lot of bills out there that  
18 just could potentially impact, you know,  
19 different processes as it relates to state  
20 agencies with Boards. Those are too numerous,  
21 I think, to go over, although one of them was  
22 mentioned today, a requirement for any public  
23 meeting to be done electronically. So we might  
24 be forced under state law to move to electronic  
25 access to all Board meetings moving forward, so

1     that one is pending as well.

2           Any questions about the -- literally, I  
3     think there's been over 2,000 bills dropped in  
4     the last two, two and a half weeks. So, I  
5     mean, I'm scrolling late at night going through  
6     them to see, and I guess I just missed the  
7     compact bill.

8           But, you know, if you have questions,  
9     though, about any specific proposed  
10    legislation, I'll be glad to send that out.

11           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Is that it?

12           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: I'm  
13    good.

14           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: Okay. New  
15    business.

16           I would like to ask the Board's permission  
17    to get our Director to -- I don't know if  
18    everybody knows this, but we have a new dean.  
19    Does everybody know that? Dr. Kirk, Pia Kirk,  
20    is our new dean.

21           We are meeting again in April --  
22           Is that right, Denny?

23           EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MR. HYDRICK: The  
24    17th, yeah.

25           BOARD PRESIDENT DR. GRUBBS: -- for us

1 to invite her to have lunch with us, if  
2 that's okay with everybody.

3 BOARD MEMBER DR. CURTIS: Uh-huh

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**CONSENT ORDER - SURRENDER**

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**WHEREAS, RESPONDENT, COREY BENJAMIN BYARS,** has been vested with the right and privilege to practice dental hygiene in the State of Mississippi by virtue of License No. **4789-22DH**, issued by the Mississippi State Board of Dental Examiners (hereinafter referred to as "Board").

**WHEREAS, RESPONDENT, COREY BENJAMIN BYARS,** has agreed to enter into a **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**, pursuant to 30 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2302, R. 1.10, which would, upon approval and execution by the Board, avoid initiation of formal disciplinary proceedings.

**FINDINGS OF FACT**

1. **RESPONDENT** holds an active Mississippi dental hygiene license, License No. 4789-22DH, which was initially issued on or about June 13<sup>th</sup>, 2022.
2. In or around March 2025, the Board conducted a random compliance audit for the biennial renewal period January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2024, to ensure compliance with 30 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2301, R. 1.41 – (Board Regulation No. 41 – Continuing Education). **RESPONDENT** was randomly selected to participate in the audit. In response to the Board's audit, **RESPONDENT** submitted evidence of completion of eight (8) hours of Board-approved continuing education.  
**RESPONDENT'S** failure and/or refusal to produce records evidencing completion of the

required twenty (20) hours of Board-approved continuing education for the biennial renewal period January 01<sup>st</sup>, 2023, to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2024, constitutes a violation of 30 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2301, R. 1.41.

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

1. The Mississippi State Board of Dental Examiners is established pursuant to Title 73, Chapter 9 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, and is charged with the duty of licensing and regulating the practice of dentistry and dental hygiene in the State of Mississippi. The **RESPONDENT** is the holder and/or applicant of a license issued by the Board and is, therefore, subject to Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-1, et seq.
2. Pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-61 (1), upon satisfactory proof, and in accordance with statutory provisions elsewhere set out for such hearings and protecting the rights of the accused as well as the public, the State Board of Dental Examiners may deny the issuance or renewal of a license or may revoke or suspend the license of any licensed dentist or dental hygienist practicing in the State of Mississippi, or take any other action in relation to the license as the Board may deem proper under the circumstances, for: *(b) Willful violation of any of the rules or regulations duly promulgated by the Board, or of any of the rules or regulations duly promulgated by the appropriate dental licensure agency of another state or jurisdiction.*
3. Pursuant to Board Regulation 41, Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2301, R. 1.41 (2), *Licensed dental hygienists must complete twenty (20) hours of Board-approved CDE per biennial renewal period.*
4. **RESPONDENT'S** conduct violates Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-61 (1)(b) and Board Regulation 41, 30 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2301, R. 1.41., and constitutes grounds for disciplinary action by the Board, pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-61 (1).

### **ORDER**

**IT IS THEREFORE AGREED AND ORDERED:**

1. **RESPONDENT'S** license shall be subject to the following penalties and actions authorized by Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-61.
  - a. **SURRENDER** of dental hygiene license no. 4789-22DH. The **SURRENDER** of licensure shall have the same effect as license revocation. Immediately upon Board approval and execution of this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**, **RESPONDENT** shall no longer be authorized to practice dental hygiene in the state of Mississippi, and **RESPONDENT** shall NOT practice dental hygiene in the state of Mississippi.
    - i. Immediately upon Board approval and execution of this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**, **RESPONDENT'S** license status with the Board, including for purposes of license verification by the public, shall indicate "REVOKED."
    - ii. Pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-65, the Board may, for good cause shown, reinstate any license revoked or suspended. Should **RESPONDENT** seek to have dental hygiene license no. 4789-22DH reinstated in the future, **RESPONDENT** shall petition the Board, and **RESPONDENT** shall carry the burden of showing good cause why the license should be reinstated. **RESPONDENT** shall be responsible for any costs associated with seeking reinstatement of license.
    - iii. In order to seek reinstatement pursuant to Miss. Code Ann. § 73-9-65, **RESPONDENT** must also comply with 30 Miss. Admin. Code Pt. 2301, R. 1.23 – Board Regulation 23 – Reinstatement of Voided Licenses.
2. That this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** is entered into freely, willingly and voluntarily by all the parties without threats or promises, and further, such **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** is entered into in lieu of having a full administrative hearing before the Mississippi State Board of Dental Examiners.

- a. That **RESPONDENT** hereby voluntarily, willingly, and freely waives all of **RESPONDENT'S** due process rights, including but not limited to, the right to a hearing whereby **RESPONDENT** could:
    - i. Appear either personally or by counsel or both,
    - ii. Cross-examine any witnesses who may testify against **RESPONDENT**,
    - iii. Present testimony, evidence, and witnesses on **RESPONDENT'S** behalf, and
    - iv. Have subpoenas issued by the Board on **RESPONDENT'S** behalf.
  - b. That **RESPONDENT** hereby voluntarily, willingly, and freely waives any right to judicial review of this **CONSENT ORDER**.
  - c. **RESPONDENT** authorizes the Board to review and examine any documentary evidence or information concerning **RESPONDENT** prior to or in conjunction with its consideration of the **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**.
  - d. That this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** shall be subject to approval by the Board. If the Board fails to approve the **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**, it shall have no force or effect on the parties.
  - e. That should this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** not be approved by the Board, it is agreed that the presentation and consideration of the **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**, including any documentary evidence and information related thereto, shall not unfairly or illegally prejudice the Board or any of its members from participation in hearings or other proceedings pertaining to these or other matters regarding **RESPONDENT**.
3. That **RESPONDENT** accepts the above penalties and that the **RESPONDENT** does hereby fully, completely and finally release the Board, its agents, servants or employees from any and all claims, charges, demands, damages, costs, expenses, actions and causes

of action of every kind and nature which the **RESPONDENT** may now or hereafter have related to this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** between the **RESPONDENT** and the Board. The Mississippi State Board of Dental Examiners admits no liability in any way related to this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER**.

4. That this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** is considered a settlement agreement under Mississippi Rule of Evidence 408; therefore, this **CONSENT ORDER – SURRENDER** does not constitute an admission of guilt or liability.
5. That this document is a public record and will be entered as a **FINAL ORDER** of the Board. This action will be reported to the American Association of Dental Boards (AADB) and to all federally mandated data banks.


